

Waitsfield locals and visitors are enjoying a delicious assortment of activities in the Mad River Taste Place at 89 Mad River Green. They're learning about food and beverages made in the Mad River Valley and throughout Vermont, tasting samples of these products, and purchasing their favorites to take home.

Located in the former People's United Bank building, the 3,600square-foot Mad River Taste Place held its grand opening on August 10, 2017, offering beer, butter, cheese, cider, bread, chocolate, and other goods from more than 100 Vermont producers.

A Popular Place With Growing Options

Founder and President, Robin Morris, says, "So far, we've been very successful. Our vision of curated retail has been well received by both Mad River Valley visitors and residents, and we've listened carefully to their feedback and responded to it. Thanks to our strong staff—led by Mary Tuthill, Head Cheesemonger and Retail Manager—the Mad River Taste Place is now able to start implementing the programs we envisioned from inception." These programs include offering French press coffee and tea service with tastings and a ploughman's lunch.

The Mad River Taste Place is also adding new products such as:

- Babette's Table duck prosciutto made in Waitsfield
- Smoked salmon
- Local teas
- Kombucha (fermented, lightly effervescent sweetened tea drinks)
- · Calillana a (Ca
- Cold brew coffee
- · Cold pressed juices
- Regular cider (non-alcoholic)
- Fresh pasta and pasta sauce
- Pesto

Those with a love of cheese will especially want to come to the Mad River Taste Place on a regular basis. It's the new headquarters of the Vermont Cheese Council, which means you can expect to find cheeses from nearly all of Vermont's 56 cheese makers.

In addition to the Mad River Taste Place, Morris also founded the Mad River Food Hub in Waitsfield, which has been in operation for five years. (See sidebar for details.) The two businesses are closely related, explains Morris: "If you think in terms of a restaurant, the Mad River Food Hub would be the back of the house, and the Mad River Taste Place would be the front of the house."

The Mad River Food Hub is a 4,000square-foot facility where local foods are processed, stored, cured, value-added, and distributed. It's designed for smallscale food producers who need the use of a licensed facility at affordable daily rates. There are two meat processing rooms as well as a vegetable/herb processing room and a smoke room.

The Mad River Food Hub provides services including:

- Wraparound business assistance to help food producers scale and maximize profitability
- Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point (HACCP) plan development assistance
- Energy efficient, dry, cool, and frozen storage
- Distribution to retail markets throughout the Mad River Valley, Waterbury, Montpelier, and Burlington

Your Guide to Ransomware Prevention

Six essential tips for avoiding malicious computer attacks



Ransomware is a type of malicious software (malware) that can restrict access to files on your computer system, or encrypt data, making it unreadable. It then demands that you make a payment by a certain date and time to un-restrict or un-encrypt your information. Once you pay (up to several hundred dollars), you get your files back. Ransomware, such as CryptoLocker, typically propagates as a trojan and is usually disguised as a legitimate file attached to an email or on a USB drive or website.

Prevention is key when it comes to protecting your business from ransomware. Follow these six prevention tips:

- **1**Install a reputable anti-virus/anti-malware software that features on-demand scanning. Remember that anti-virus software alone may not be able to prevent a ransomware infection and can do nothing once your system is infected. Good anti-virus protection is only one part of a smart prevention program. Schedule your anti-virus/anti-malware software to automatically run scans at least once per week.
- 2. Ensure all your software is up to date. Software includes your operating system, browser (including plugins), and all applications. Malware makers commonly exploit software vulnerabilities, and keeping yours up to date decreases the likelihood of this method being used on your system.

3. Never open an email attachment unless you know exactly what it is and trust the sender, and don't click links within emails unless you know where the link is going. Email attachments and website links are two of the primary ways ransomware is transmitted.

If you use cloud services such as Google Apps, Microsoft Office 365, or Microsoft Azure, consider investing in a cloud-to-cloud secure backup solution. Cloud-to-cloud backup solutions offer an additional secure copy of your data that maintains prior versions, which, in the event of an attack, gives you the unencrypted files without the ransomware infection.

Install a "next-generation" firewall that is capable of unified threat management. It can help prevent suspicious traffic from reaching your internal network.

Most importantly, back up your data. Imagine the worst happens, and you're not able to access your data due to a ransomware attack. You'll still have all your information readily available. The key is making sure your data is backed up regularly with a reliable service.

While the ransomware can be removed, prevention is crucial for protecting your data from being encrypted or restricted. If your system does become infected, don't pay the ransom! Instead, remove the affected system from your network and restore your backed up files.
